100 years! Imagine all the things one could do and see over that time. And imagine 78 of those years as a Little Sister of the Poor!

Our Little Sister Pauline knows exactly what that is like. This past December, she celebrated her 100th birthday here at the Jeanne Jugan Center with friends, family, Little Sisters, and Residents (many of whom are, amazingly, 20+ years younger than her!).

It was a wonderful day, with Sister's family members coming from far and near to join in from Topeka, KS, from Florida, even from her home country of Colombia, South America.

Fr. Andrés Moreno, originally from Colombia as well, celebrated Mass and gave a moving homily about Sister being a vehicle for God's graces and blessings. The Mass ended with Father leading a lively rendition of "Happy Birthday" in both Spanish and English.

Sister Marie Pauline de Ste. Helene was born on December 30, 1918 in Medellín, Colombia. After making her first vows in 1940, she was sent to the United States, and has been here ever since.

Sister has served in 11 homes, spanning the country from San Francisco, to Queens, New York, doing a variety of jobs throughout the years. She has worked in the kitchen, the laundry, cared for Residents, done the collecting/begging, and for the past 30 years here in Kansas City, has been the much-loved craft room Sister.

We are grateful for Sister Pauline. Her quick smile, sparkling eyes, and warm presence help to make this a true home.


Celebration Continues
