Closing The Jubilee Year

Celebrating Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow

On August 23 we brought our jubilee year to a close with a Mass and reception at our neighboring parish, St. Regis. This past year, from August 2018-2019, has been a wonderful year commemorating the Little Sisters' arrival in the United States 150 years ago, and our final night of celebration was a special one.

We are grateful for the use of the church and parish hall, for all of the friends who joined us, and for Bishop Johnston, who celebrated Mass and gave a beautiful homily. He recounted how the Little Sisters came to the U.S. in 1868 and arrived in Kansas City in 1882 — the same year construction of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception began. According to

the cathedral's website, it was the tallest building in Kansas City at the time! And tickets were sold to people who wanted to go up into the tower to see the view.

A lot has certainly changed since then, both in Kansas City and the world in general. We may have taller buildings now, but one thing has remained constant throughout the years, and that is the need of the elderly to be cared for and loved; to feel safe and secure in this vulnerable time of their lives.

We are grateful to God for our vocations, and for all of you who support us in our mission of seeing Christ's face in each elderly person that we care for. We look forward to serving the elderly well into the future. May God bless you!

Many departments work behind the scenes to keep our home running smoothly and our Residents happy. And our laundry department really goes above and beyond. They're here Monday through Saturday, washing about 100 giant-sized loads of clothes and linens each week. Along with the Residents' clothing and bedding, all the towels, table cloths, napkins, and even the curtains in the home get a thorough cleaning. And in addition to washing and drying the Residents' clothes, they also iron, mend, and/or alter them if needed.

The laundry room is a comfortable and homey place,

often filled with easy talk and laughter as the employees and volunteers chat while folding, their voices blending with the sound of machines whirring softly in the background. Residents drop by to see about getting pants hemmed, to say hello, or to ask if supervisor Jennifer might have a matching button to replace one they lost (and she always does!).

Several Residents also enjoy volunteering in the laundry room. It's a chance to be productive, stay active, to help out, and enjoy the company of their fellow folders.

We are grateful for the wonderful job this department does in keeping our Residents looking and feeling good, and helping to make a comfortable home for all those who live and work here.

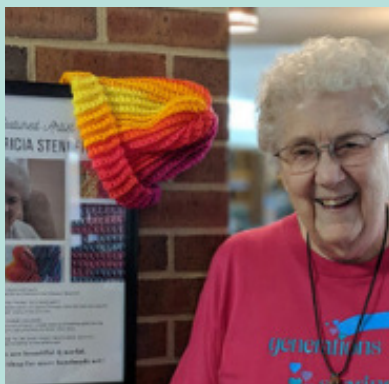
